At a glance

ECU has almost 29,000 students. We annually welcome some 5,200 international students originating from more than 100 countries.

We have 8 Schools that collectively deliver more than 300 courses – Arts and Humanities; Business and Law; Engineering; Medical and Health Sciences; Nursing and Midwifery; Science; Education; and the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA).

Our courses are offered at our three campuses – Joondalup and Mount Lawley in metropolitan Perth, and the South West Campus in Bunbury, 200km south of Perth. ECU also offers a comprehensive suite of online study options.

ECU incorporates the world-renowned Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA), the oldest and largest School of Education in Western Australia, the largest Nursing program in the State and Kurongkurl Katitjin, ECU's Centre for Australian Indigenous Education and Research.

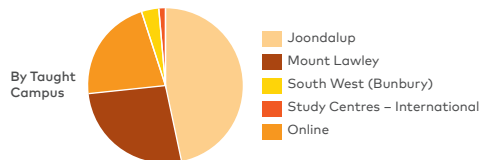

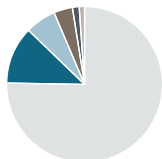

Explanation Notes for Australian Graduate Survey:

- The Course Experience Questionnaire (CEQ) and Graduate Destination Survey (GDS) are components of the national Australian Graduate Survey of all university graduates, conducted by Graduate Careers Australia (GCA).
- Graduates are surveyed 4 months after course completion, mainly around April for end-of-year completers.
- ECU has exceeded the GCA's minimum Response Rate of 50%.
- The CEQ measures relate to bachelor-level graduates, both domestic and onshore international.
- The GDS Full-time employment and Further study measures relate to bachelor-level domestic graduates only.
- The CEQ measure is percent Agreement. This is the percentage of responses which score 4 or 5 on a 5-point agreement scale.
- Full Time Employment is the percentage of domestic Bachelor course graduates in full-time employment as a proportion of all domestic Bachelor graduates in or seeking full-time work.
- Nat.: National average.

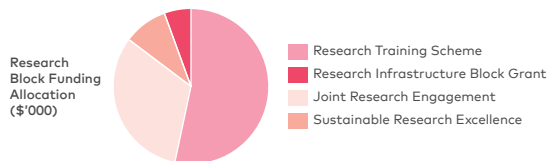
