About ECU

Edith Cowan University (ECU) is a young and progressive university with a strong reputation for excellence in teaching, and state of the art facilities. Our dedicated teachers and researchers develop and impart knowledge that transforms the lives of, not just the individuals who study with us, but also the lives of people in communities around the world.

ECU has strong values that are owned and demonstrated by the whole University community. These values influence how we work, and flow to the University's commitments on societal issues such as reconciliation, gender equality, opportunities for disadvantaged people, and reducing negative impacts on the environment.

ECU's dedication to its students has been recognised with five star ratings for teaching quality for twelve consecutive years from the Good Universities Guide. This makes ECU one of just two public universities, and the only one in Western Australia, to have achieved such a consistently high endorsement for quality teaching.

ECU has also been named in the Times Higher Education (THE) Young University Rankings for 2018. This recognises the world's 150 best universities less than 50 years of age. In the Quality Indicators for Learning and Teaching (QILT) 2018 results, for a second year in a a row, ECU received the top student satisfaction score of all Australia's public universities, with 85% of students rating ECU positively. Students also ranked ECU the top Western Australian public university for teaching quality, student support and skills development.

At a glance

ECU has over 30,000 students. Annually we welcome almost 6,000 international students originating from nearly 100 countries

We have eight schools – Arts and Humanities; Business and Law; Education; Engineering; Medical and Health Sciences; Nursing and Midwifery; Science; and the Western Australian Academy of Preforming Arts (WAAPA) delivering a range of courses, from three campuses – Joondalup and Mount Lawley, in metropolitan Perth, and the South West Campus in Bunbury, 200km south of Perth. ECU also offers a comprehensive suite of online study options.

ECU incorporates the world-renowned Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) and Kurongkurl Katitjin, ECU's Centre for Australian Indiaenous Education and Research.

ECU has the largest and longest established School of Education in Western Australia and the largest Nursing program in the State.



- 8. The Student Experience Survey (SES) and Graduate Outcomes Survey (GOS) are components of the national QILT suite of surveys of all university students and graduates, conducted by the Social Research Centre on behalf of the Commonwealth Government. - 9. The SES measure relates to undergraduate domestic and onshore international students. The SES measure is percent Satisfied. This is the percentage of responses which score 3 or 4 (Good or Excellent) on a 4-point satisfaction scale. 10. The GOS Full-time employment and median salary measures relate to undergraduate domestic graduates only. 2016 was the first year of the GOS. Full-time employment is the percentage of undergraduate domestic graduates in full-time employment as a proportion of all undergraduate domestic graduates who were available for full-time employment. Graduates are surveyed 4 months after course completion, mainly May for end-of-year completers.
